



THEME: World War 1

KS1 and foundation

TIME: Flexible to meet with schools needs and requirements

VENUE: Hall or classroom

ARTIST FEE: £350 per day plus travel

Outline: Men, Metal and Mules

This workshop starts with a storytelling session about a group of characters including a story man, a blacksmith and a horse trainer. We follow their journey from signing up to become soldiers through to how the skills they bring with them from their different backgrounds help them to deal with being a soldier and help each other.

*For younger children (Nursery/Reception) we have Jewel the Mule who tells the story in rhyme of some of the 250,000 mules used in WW1.

These workshops have been designed to entertain and educate in a careful and responsible way.

Children would be encouraged to think about soldiers as ordinary people who felt many of the same emotions as children do when in different environments. To think about the animals especially the mules and how they helped the soldiers and how the soldiers bonded with the mules most of which came all the way from America.

Some questions would be posed and discussion encouraged, for example; What skills do the children have that they think would be useful for helping their friends if they were soldiers? What would they miss the most about being away from home?

How would they look after the mules and if they had their own what would they call it?

The workshop (for KS1) would last 45 minutes, 30 minutes of interactive storytelling and another 15 minutes of children starting to write/create pictures of what they've heard their mule etc. The storyteller would help get them started with this. Teachers would be guided on how to continue this as follow up work.

The workshop (for Nursery/Reception) would be 25 minutes interactive storytelling after which children would be encouraged to create pictures of what they've heard their mule etc. The storyteller would help get them started with this. Teachers would be guided on how to continue this as follow up work.

Workshop Leader Bio.

Richard is an experienced professional storyteller and author who has been storytelling at the Imperial War Museum since 2005. He runs storytelling and writing workshops for children and adults throughout the UK. He delivers storytelling skills training workshops to a number of professionals including those education, health and business.

Born into a large Romani family and a 5th generation storyteller, the artist has written 9 children's books, had plays professionally performed on BBC Radio 3 and 4, the Edinburgh festival and the Soho theatre London. His clients include schools, local authorities, museums, libraries and festival organisers. He tells stories in over 100 schools a year

Recent and current clients, include Worcestershire council, Imperial War museum, (North and London), Southern Housing association, Stoke City council, Arts Council, Chorlton book festival, Writing East Midlands and a number of primary, secondary and special schools including Co-op and North East Church of England academies and the North West Employers association.

The artist is currently Writer in residence at Babington College and Medway primary through the Arts Council Mighty creative project.

He regularly creates special events for schools and others including 'Bring a Story to School Week', 'The Whittlesey Whopper', 'Woodcraft and Wordcraft' and 'Freed2Read.'

Foundation & KS1:
